- Ensuring that all human beings can fulfill their potential in dignity and equality and in a healthy environment





PLANET

- Protecting the planet from degradation, including through sustainable consumption and production
- Sustainably managing its natural resources
- Taking urgent action on climate change, so that it can support the needs of the present and future generations





PROSPERITY

 Ensuring that all human beings can enjoy prosperous and fulfilling lives and that economic, social and technological progress occurs in harmony with nature





PEACE

 Fostering peaceful, just and inclusive societies which are free from fear and violence - there can be no sustainable development without peace and no peace without sustainable development



WHAT ARE THE VOLUNTARY NATIONAL REVIEWS (VNRs)?

VNRs are part of the follow-up/review mechanisms of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development.

Member states opt to present their progress towards the SDGs through a VNR report and presentation at the High-level Political Forum (HLPF) on Sustainable Development.

VNRs allow member states to share experiences, challenges, best practices and lessons learned.



Since 2016, over 200 VNRs have been submitted by UN member states.

TRENDS OF VOLUNTEERING IN THE VNRS


Between 2016 and 2020, more than half of the VNRs have recognized volunteer contributions to the SDGs.

The share of VNRs that recognize volunteer contributions increased as reports better reflect whole-of-society approaches.

Over time, VNRs related volunteering to all 17 Goals, showing its relevance across all goals.



Percentage of VNRs that acknowledge the positive contributions of volunteers to the SDGs



In 2020, the importance of volunteering for health and vulnerable groups became more prominent as part of COVID-19 responses.

WHY INCLUDE VOLUNTEERING IN VNRs?



Several **high-level UN documents** recognize volunteer contributions to the SDGs and encourage member states to reflect volunteer contributions in VNRs.

The 2020 QCPR recognizes that "volunteerism can be a powerful and cross-cutting means of implementation of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development" and encourages the UN system, member states, and others to support and facilitate volunteerism and volunteers.

Incorporating data on volunteer efforts can also **help countries to report in line with the principles of the VNRs**, particularly to:

- Integrate a multi-stakeholder perspective & local engagement
- Draw on existing national official statistics & other sources
- Analyze means of implementation, gaps & opportunities



HOW TO INCLUDE VOLUNTEERING IN VNRs?

Governments have incorporated information on volunteer contributions over the years in 5 principal ways:

- Volunteers as a critical resource for addressing development priorities, including COVID-19 responses.
- Voluntary actions strengthen the ability to reach the furthest behind.
- Volunteering can provide leadership opportunities for women & marginalized groups, giving them greater voice and ownership in development processes.
- Volunteers as innovators, bringing new perspectives to the table and strengthening social cohesion.
- Volunteers help raise awareness of the 2030 Agenda and improve participation for the SDGs.



WHAT IS A STRONG MENTION OF VOLUNTEER CONTRIBUTIONS?

As part of UNV's 2018-2021 Strategic Framework (SF), UNV measures the strength of mentions of volunteer contributions to the SDGs based on a set of criteria:

| Criteria | SF Indicator Status |
|--|-----------------------------------|
| General mention of volunteers | Not included |
| Anecdotal mention of volunteers & their activities | Included |
| Anecdotal mention of volunteering results | Included |
| Policy linkages to volunteerism | Included |
| Evidence of results of volunteer activity results | Included – strongly substantiated |
| Evidence of volunteerism contributions | Included – strongly substantiated |
| Evidence of integration into policy & planning | Included – strongly substantiated |

Data collection:

- Dissemination of online surveys via UNV's online volunteering roster of 600,000 persons
- On-the-ground surveys with remote communities to get feedback and input to VNRs through volunteer networks



Consultation & Validation:

- Stakeholder workshops with volunteers & VIOs to document initiatives and approaches under specific SDGs
- Volunteer-led workshops with other target groups

History of the process at FV

- Starting in 2017 with two countries
- 4 years of experience in 19 countries
- Main objectives: to include the contribution of volunteering in these national reviews + an opportunity to start or intensify the dialogue with national authorities
- Creation of an internal working group each year

1) Context analysis

2) Creation of a collective dynamic around the VNR

- 3) Elaboration of an action plan
- 4) Monitoring and implementation of the action plan
- 5) Evaluation process

A five-step process

Concrete examples

- Successful examples
- Examples that did not work but had positive repercussions
- Other actions around HLPF






